



This week we are blessed to hear at Mass the beginning of the greatest sermon ever preached: Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Mt 5-7). In the first twelve verses known as the Beatitudes, Jesus gives us much more than a list of do's and don'ts; He teaches us the interior attitudes or dispositions proper to the human heart and mind through which we find the ultimate fulfillment, "Blessedness," in this life and for all eternity. In a word, He teaches us what it means to be human—to be fully alive. He teaches us how to love. Every human being wants to be happy and every human being is striving for happiness. Unfortunately, we know happiness can be illusive. In our fallen state, we are easily deceived about what leads to true happiness and to make matters worse, we are often too weak to choose rightly even when we know what is best! Jesus, in the Beatitudes, paints us a portrait of the truly happy, "blessed," soul.

Obviously, we cannot exhaust the meaning of the Beatitudes in one page! I offer here a single thought for each:

BLESSED ARE THE POOR. The poor in spirit are humble—they know themselves to be radically dependent on God for everything. They never consider themselves better than others.

BLESSED ARE THOSE WHO MOURN. Those who mourn are compassionate; they understand God's perfect goodness and love and therefore they weep for their own sins. Furthermore, because they have good will toward all, they weep for the sins of all people.

BLESSED ARE THE MEEK. The meek are submissive and obedient to the truth no matter what the cost.

BLESSED ARE THEY WHO HUNGER AND THIRST FOR RIGHTEOUSNESS. These are not passive. They forcefully desire to be holy and zealously combat the injustices of the world.

BLESSED ARE THE MERCIFUL. The merciful are quick to forgive others as God has forgiven them.

BLESSED ARE THE SINGLE-HEARTED (PURE OF HEART). The single-hearted are without guile; their life is centered on one thing, the most important thing: doing God's will. They are not hypocrites—what you see is what you get. They do not try to impress others by "practicing their righteousness before men" (Mt 6:1) or by putting on a show of righteousness.

BLESSED ARE THE PEACEMAKERS. The peacemaker is the one who continuously, in good times and bad, abandons his life and soul to God's providence and thus maintains peace with God. Having God's peace within, the peacemaker communicates the peace of Christ to others following example of Jesus who said, "My peace I give to you."

BLESSED ARE THOSE PERSECUTED FOR HOLINESS SAKE. Courage consists of a willingness to suffer in order to attain the higher good. Those willing to suffer for holiness' sake are truly courageous.

Jesus' teaching is radical, but it is absolutely true! For many in our culture, happiness is thought to be gained by more money, more pleasures, more entertainment, more comfort, more popularity, more parties, etc. . While all these things have their rightful place, they cannot take the place of the Beatitudes. Jesus' teaching inspires us to walk with Him who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. True happiness is reserved for the humble, compassionate, meek, righteous, merciful, single-hearted, peaceable, courageous. In a word, happiness is the fruit of love, and the true meaning of human love is fully revealed to us, not in a book or a philosophical construct, but in a Person: Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us. To be with Jesus, and to be like Jesus, is to be happy.
